

Neandertal and modern Humans at Les Rois

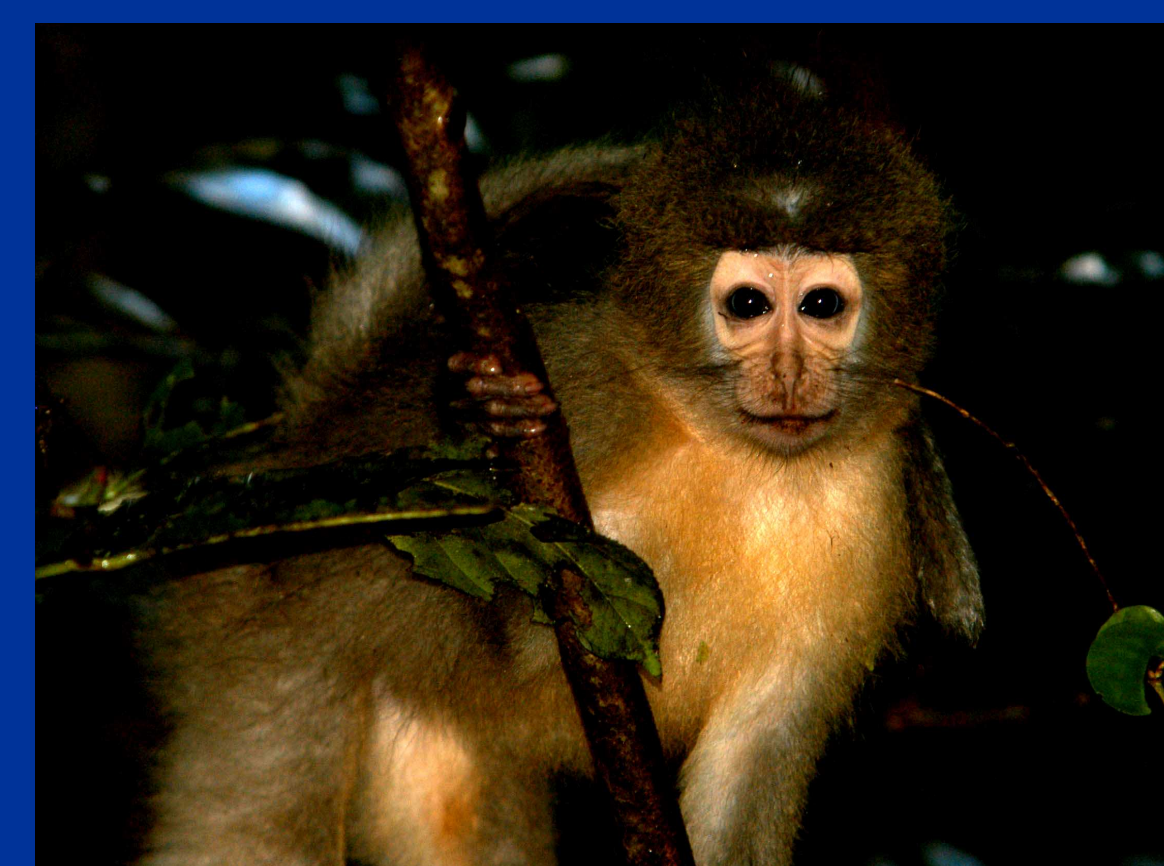

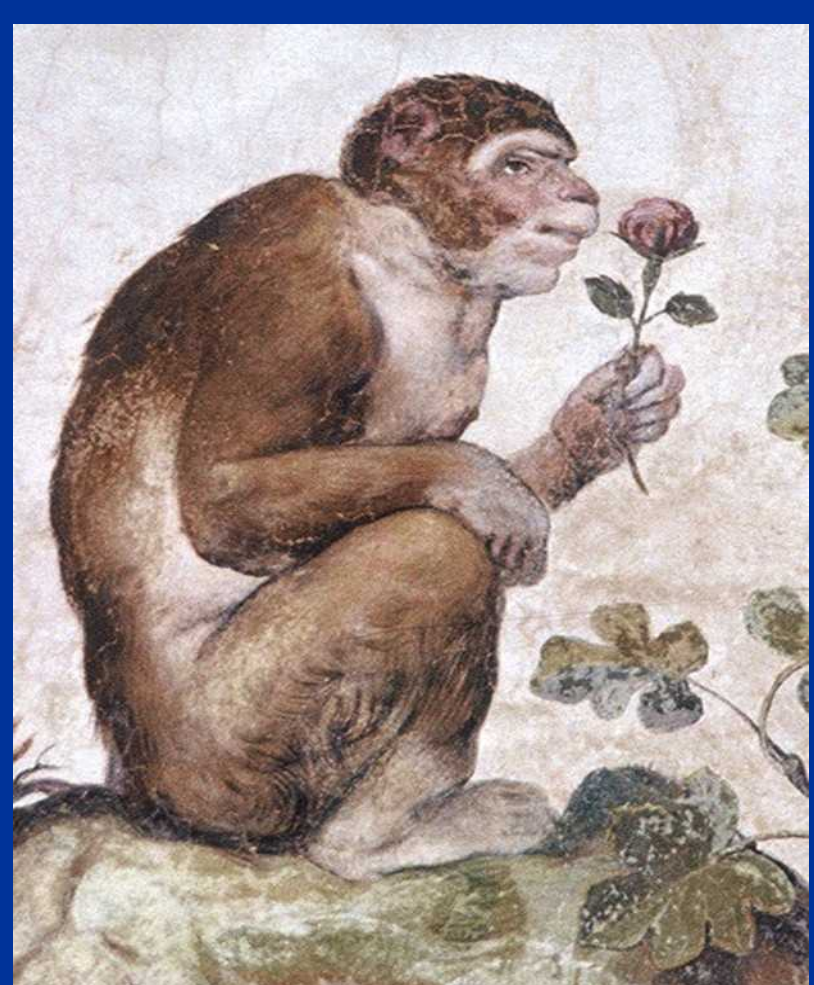

Cranial trepanation from Ebla, Syria

A description of one of the oldest cases of skull trepanation found in the Near East, found in a funeral pit in the Syrian city of Ebla dating back to the end of the Middle Bronze Age II (1650-1600 B.C.). Deposition of new bone indicates that the subject survived for a long period after surgery.
